Gateball Captain Development Course 2023

Currently Australian teams struggle against international opposition teams. This will change. The A.C.A. has given support to the Gateball group and a Gateball Captain's course was developed and run to help develop the strength and tactical skills to improve the performance of Gateball players.

This course, which received financial support from the Moreton Bay Regional Council, was held over the weekend of May 20th and 21st when twenty-four Gateball captains were invited to attend the Eildon Croquet Club at Woody Point – a northern suburb of Brisbane.

Course presenters included Philip Brown – the Gateball High Performance Couch and South Australia's own Geoff Crook from the Woodville C.C.

Over the two days various ideas, tactics strategies, philosophies and training ideas were discussed and then followed by exercises on the courts in small groups. The various captains then take these concepts home to their clubs.

Brighton Croquet Club History Matters: Episode 2

Croquet started in Brighton when a group of ladies played on private land on the western side of Brighton Road between Sturt Road and St Judes Church. A club had much earlier formed at Glenelg (now called Holdfast Bay) and perhaps this spurred the Brighton ladies to start up a club in 1915 with the intent to play against their northern neighbour.

The Brighton croquet players were a savvy and resourceful group and so sought to buy a parcel of land on which to site their Club. They ultimately bought the land at the south-eastern corner of Torr Avenue and Keelara Street. This site was adjacent to the Brighton Tennis Club which had some of the croquet ladies' spouses and relatives amongst its membership and so co-operation between these two sports clubs naturally followed.

By 1919 another Club was launched at nearby Seacliff on Waratah Street. Seacliff Club's founder, Susan Grace Benny, was a Brighton Councillor and has been quite recently honoured by the placement of a bust-statuette outside the Brighton Library (which fails to acknowledge her considerable croquet involvement) and she also has a Reserve named after her in Seacliff Park. Yet another Club, named Araluen, came into being near the corner of Beach Road and the Esplanade about 1926. Araluen was the brainchild of the energetic 'Sesca' Somerville. There was plenty of choice then at this time to join one these three single-court croquet clubs. They were all clubs of serious intent as each affiliated ready for competition in the State Croquet Association.

Note the common element here? All three Clubs were formed for ladies to partake in the sport. Croquet was a women's game in that era; men played Bowls. Another nearby Club - Oaklands - sprang into existence in 1930 but both Araluen and Seacliff clubs had disbanded by 1940. Brighton lived on.
